About our College

Trinity College Gladstone, situated in Central Queensland at 4 Archer Street, Gladstone is an independent, co-educational school catering for students from Kindergarten to Year 12.

The College is a ministry of the Gladstone Baptist Church and is governed by a limited liability company who are responsible for ensuring the capacity of the college to fulfil its mission for current and future generations. Our College is governed by an elected board which meets several times a year. The current Company Directors who make up the College Board is comprised of the College Principal, and representatives from the Church.

The school is affiliated with Independent Schools Queensland and Christian Schools Australia, which is a national association of over 125 schools and 40,000 students. We are also members of the Association of Christian Schools International.

Trinity College Gladstone recognises that each student has their own unique giftings and talents to be encouraged and developed. As we journey with our students, whether academic, sporting, cultural and a mix of all three, we delight in seeing them grow into themselves as they transition through the years.

We had 552 students in our Primary and Secondary School comprising of 305 primary students and 247 secondary students. We also guided the youthful enthusiasm of 38 Kindy students.

Distinctive curriculum offerings



At Trinity College Gladstone, the curriculum, from Preparatory to Year 10 is organised around the Australian Curriculum. The curriculum in Years 11 and 12 is based on a range of Queensland Curriculum and Assessment Authority syllabuses. The senior secondary academic program is intentionally tailored around the needs of individual students yet lining up with the requirements set out to obtain a QCE.

Additional learning opportunities and activities on offer are:

- Years 4-12 are supported by a 1:1 school-loan Apple device system. iPads in classrooms in Years 2-6, MacBooks in classrooms for Year 6 and MacBooks from Year 7.
- Mandatory camping program for years
 5, 6, 7, 9 and 11.
- Work placement for Year 10 students (a complete one-week block) with individually tailored placements.
- Our "Reach" program, for differentiation and improvement of student potential
- Distance education opportunities
- TAFE course options
- Apprenticeship and community connection prospects

- Terms 1 & 4 Buddy program:
 - Year 12 with Year 7
 - Year 11 with Year 6
 - Year 6 with Prep

We invest in our Leaders both Primary and Secondary by attending external leadership conferences, one to one mentoring for each of our senior secondary leaders within their portfolios.

The kindergarten uses the Early Years Learning Framework and Queensland Kindergarten Learning Guidelines as the foundation of its Kindergarten program.









Student Satisfaction


In 2021, 260 students participated in the student survey involving students from Years 5 to 12. Two sample responses are included.






Staff Satisfaction


In 2021, fifty-five staff chose to complete the anonymous staff survey. Two sample answers are included:






Parent Satisfaction

Staff Information

Trinity College had an average of forty-eight staff and maintained a retention rate of 85% from 2020 into 2021. Our teaching staff come from a range of cultural back grounds, however we currently have no teaching staff of Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander heritage. All our teachers are committed Christians who, as well as being professionally competent, are deeply committed to encouraging and developing the God given skills and talents of our students.

Staff Retention

Staff Retention is an important factor in maintaining continuity of culture, community, student and staff relationships. Continuity ensures continual improvement of program as faculties can build upon experience each year. We recognise that life changes and as such, Trinity College releases staff with warmth and best wishes when the time comes for them to answer the Lord's call in other places. Our 2021 retention rate of 85.71% was up from the 2020 rate of 84%.

Student Attendance

Student attendance is monitored through the software program in TASS. Parents advise the College where non-attendance is known via phone or email.

Once rolls have been marked in the morning, an administration staff member sends out an SMS to parents and caregivers of students unaccounted for.





Where it is noted that non-attendance is high, or there is a pattern of absenteeism emerging, our teachers (primary or secondary year co-ordinators) contact the parent or caregiver. Where further engagement is required, members of the executive will become involved and interviews may be required. Where necessary, the relevant authorities may be alerted.

We recognise that without regular attendance, it is difficult to engage with the material and the cohort and as such, encourage students to not just attend, but participate in classes and extra-curricular opportunities.

Results

Data analysis has shown areas which need improvement in Year 3 results, however, from Year 5 upwards, Trinity College achieved excellent results in the region, including being the third best school for Years 7 and 9 for the Central Queensland region, and leader in Gladstone. Year 5 also was the highest achieving school in Gladstone other than Faith Baptist Christian School.






